The state of sociological inquiry into inequality:

- What are the current trends and future directions in sociological theories on inequality? How can we theorise the intersection between different social and economic inequalities?
- Is it useful to theorise 'inequality' or do we risk creating a 'theory of everything' that lacks specific and contextual relevance?

Putting theory into research practice:

- How useful are theories of inequality for social research? How can postgraduate students put theories on inequality to work in their research design, practice and analysis?
- How can methodological developments provide innovative ways for better understanding inequality?

This interdisciplinary event will be of interest to postgraduate and career researchers working in the broad field of inequality, policy analysts, and practitioners in services which address the consequences of social inequality.
